
### Other changes to the website

# Sutcliffe's Alchemy: Silver

Progress is underway with *Sutcliffe's Alchemy: Silver* (the imaginatively titled sequel to *Gold*). The story picks up with Brock living his new life as a stock analyst in Perth, Western Australia. Originally, this part of Brock's messed-up world was included in

*Gold*, but the storyline was becoming rushed, so at the advice of my editor, the stockbroking chapters were pushed into a book of their own. I had hoped to write *Silver* straight after *Gold*, but I was distracted by the idea of a series of historical fantasies, which meant *Tapestries* pushed in front. It was a fun break from Brock's machinations.

Which brings me to a month ago, when for the first time on my tour along the winding road of writing, I was overcome by a debilitating fog of writer's block. What came to my rescue was a blog I read, posted some time ago by a successful Amazon author. He suggested interviewing your characters to learn more about them. Okay, this is weird. These are my own creations so how do I go about interviewing fictional characters who live rent-free in my head? Armed with a list of eight questions to ask them (what do you care about most in the world; if you could succeed at one thing what would it be; what was your childhood like, and so forth...) I listened, metaphorically, to what they had to say. Thirteen pages and 6,000 words later I knew more about them than ever! And before you reach for the delete button to escape this nutcase, I've since learnt that many authors do this. I'll let you decide what that tells you about writers.

Hopefully by the Summer newsletter I'll have a first draft. Which is a bold statement as I'm only half-way through the story. Time to burn the all night candle.
