
Update on Short Stories



After missing out on winning the Newcastle Herald short story competition, held over January this year, I was stoked to then get a call from the Herald saying I'd won the Reader's Choice award! Sutcliffe's Alchemy: Silver

Progress on the sequel to Gold continues when the opportunity arises. The first draft has passed the 50,000-word mark (about 180 pages when printed), yet there's still plenty of story to go. What's tough, of course, is that a decent chunk of the draft will get thrown out. I talk about that process in an earlier blog using the comparison with [polishing gemstones](#). I suspect everyone writes differently, although many must enjoy what I'm going through right now, which is watching a character do things that I would never dream of undertaking. There's no way I'd create a company for the sole purpose of market manipulation. Here's a passage from Silver,

Only small and speculative, little amounts of money on the edge. He musn't be stupid this time. After visiting the Dixon Range guys up at Halls Creek in Western Australia, Brock now wanted to secure his own mining tenements. But to do that he needed a company to hold the licences without a link to him. It was a simple job for his lawyer sister. Then he'd cover the rest. Several years at Villon & Walters had taught Brock how to sell a story to the stock market. He knew how to make a company's mineral resource sound sexier than it really was. While he daydreamed of making his fortune, Brock landed on a name for his future company—Meles Resources.
